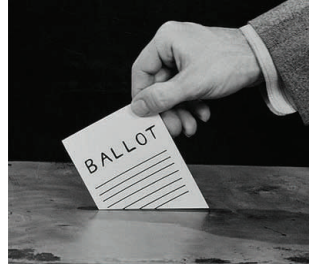

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Why Should I Vote?

Can I vote?

Now that you are aware of the many individual, statewide, and national benefits of voting, you may be wondering if you are eligible to vote. You must register within your state of residency in order to vote. So, let's review the registration requirements. Please check yes or no to the following questions:

- Are you a citizen of the United States?

- Are you 18 years or older before the election date?

- Are you a resident of Tennessee?

- If you are a convicted felons please visit www.aclu-tn.org/votingrights.html for more info on how to get your rights restored.
**Note--- If you are in the military and abroad, or living in a foreign country, you still must register in your state of permanent residency.*

If you have answered YES to all questions, congratulations, you can vote!

If you have answered NO to any of these questions, it is still important that you review the guide. Therefore, when you reach the age of 18, or become a U.S. citizen, you will be ready to make your voice heard or you can share this information with others!

Great! I am eligible to vote! Now, what do I have to do?

As previously mentioned, registration is required to vote. So, here is the basic info on how to register and vote. You only need to register once. This registration will be good for any upcoming state or federal election .

You must register at least 30 days before the Election Day.


Last day to Register to Vote.	October 4, 2010.
First Day for Early Voting in Person.	October 13, 2010.
Last Day for Early Voting in Person	October 28, 2010.
Election Day (State and Federal General Elections)	November 2, 2010.

Please note that the deadline to register to vote in the November 2010 elections is October 4, 2010!

How and Where To Register To Vote

If you are within the 30 day time frame for the next elections, this is great news! You may be eligible to exercise your right to vote! Here is some information on **how and where to register to vote**.

- **First Step:** Find a Registration Form.
 - Where can I get it? You can find them in many places. For instance, we have some at the TIRRC office to share with you! Other places where you can find them include your local election commission, post office, public library, or Department of Safety, to name a few.

Mail-In Application For Voter Registration 

You can use this form to:
 • register to vote in Tennessee, or to
 • let us know that your name or address has changed.
To register to vote:
 • you must be a U.S. citizen, AND
 • you must be a resident of Tennessee, AND
 • you must be at least 18 years old on or before the next election, AND
 • you must not have been convicted of a felony, or if you have, your full rights of citizenship must have been restored (or you must have received a pardon).
 • Anyone who registers by mail, must vote in person the first time he or she votes after registering.

MAIL OR HAND DELIVER THIS FORM TO YOUR COUNTY ELECTION COMMISSION.

If you are qualified and the information on your form is complete, we will send your name to the county's voter rolls. We will then mail you a voter card. This card will tell you where to vote.

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WARNING: Giving false information to register to vote or attempting to register when not qualified is a felony punishable by not less than one (1) year nor more than six (6) years imprisonment or a fine of \$3,000 or both.

- **Second Step:** Complete the registration form and mail it, or hand it to your local County Election Commission office!
 - If you are registering to vote for the first time, you must present an acceptable form of identification, such as: TN drivers license, student I.D, or military I.D.
 - Mail applications: Make sure you mail your application to your local county election commission office. Be aware that if you mail your form, you must vote in person, if this happens to be your first time voting.
 - Register in person: You can register in person at the same location in which you obtained your application.

If you have any questions when filling out the application, or need translation assistance, please contact TIRRC. We will be glad to assist you throughout this process!

Please do not be discouraged from registering to vote if you do not submit your application within the 30 days time frame. You will still be able to vote in future elections. So, complete the voter registration form in preparation for upcoming elections!

Note:

Mail applications needs to be postmarked, and has to be delivered to the election commission within the 30 day time frame. If you have registered by mail, you should vote in person. Voting by mail will not be allowed for first time voters who did not register in person.

I am registered to vote now! What should I do next before Election Day?

Once you have been approved by the Election Commission, you will receive your voter registration card in the mail. Usually, it takes up to a couple of weeks to receive your voter registration card.

Please review this sample voter identification card so you become more familiar with it.

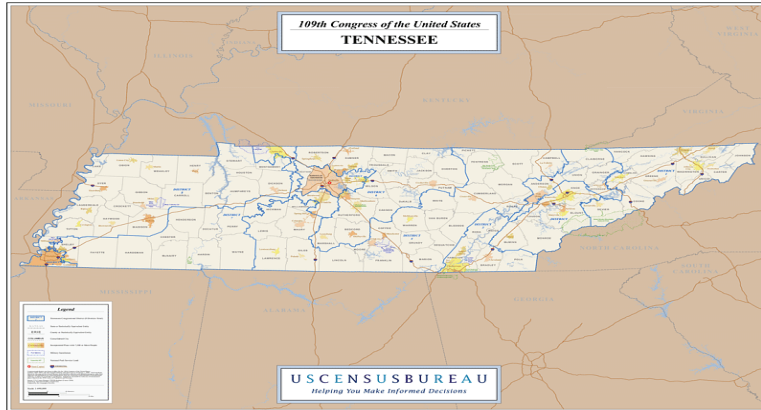
VOTER'S SIGNATURE

Which is my District?

To vote, you will need to determine what district you are in. If you know your district, you will know the candidates that you can vote for, as well as their respective positions on issues and current legislation.

Your voter identification card has a list of numbers on the front. These numbers are your district numbers. For example on the sample voter identification shown, the State House district is 60, the State Senate district is 21 and the U.S. Congress district is 7.

Who Are My Candidates?

Now that you know your voting district, you should figure out which candidates within the district need your vote. To find out more about this, please visit the list of official candidates for the 2010 elections from Tennessee Department of State (<http://www.state.tn.us/sos/election/qualify/index.htm>); contact your county election commission, public library, or your local League of Women Voters (www.LWV-TN.org).

How Can I Find More Information on Candidates?

Now that you know your choices, you should exercise your right to vote wisely. To help you determine the best candidate for you, ask yourself the following questions: Who shares your ideas and values? Who represents your beliefs? Who will fight for issues important to you? Who has the most experience? The best method through which you can get to know your candidates is through media, public forums or debates. So, keep track of them and listen to their ideas and make sure how each candidate stands on issues important to you! You can also visit the candidates' web pages or call their office for more information about them.

Where will I go vote? (Poll Location)

A poll location is the place where you go to vote. Volunteers or poll workers will be present at poll locations to assist you through your voting process. If you are voting on election day (Nov 2) you can only go vote at the address or poll location found on your voter card. If you are an early voter (voting between Oct 13-Oct 28) you can vote on any poll location from your county.

Absentee Voting

There are two categories for absentee voting:

1. **Early voting.**

- Early voting means that you can go vote in person earlier than on Election Day (Nov 2).
- Early voting dates happen between 20 days and 5 days before the elections, that is October 13– until October 28.
- The only requirement is to be a registered voter.
- **We encourage you to vote early!** Here are some reasons why to do it:
 - You don't have to stand in long lines on Election Day, it is faster and easier!
 - You can go vote at any location within your county that is convenient for you.
 - You can go vote with family and friends at the same poll location.
 - If you have any problem when trying to vote, this gives you plenty of time to solve it before Election Day is over and have your vote counted.*

2. **By mail.** This applies to those who will be outside the county or state of registration*, seniors, disabled individuals, active members of the military who are out of state or country, overseas citizens, and others. If you need to vote by mail, here are the requirements you need to fulfill to do so:

- Request an absentee-ballot from your local county election commission office either by mail, fax or email. Make sure you request this within the time frame established, between day 90 and 7 days before the Election Day.
- You need to create a document with the following info:
 - Your name, address and social security number.
 - The election in which you wish to participate.
 - Reason why you are requesting these documents by mail.
 - If you will be outside the country, provide them an address to mail the ballot.
 - Your signature.

If it is your first time voting, you can vote by mail as long as you register to vote in person, or if you are a permanent absentee voter.

What should I do for Election Day (or on early voting days)?

- If you chose to do early voting remember you can go vote at any poll location from your county of residence.
- If you are voting on Election Day you must vote at the poll location found on your Voter Identification Card.
- Don't forget to bring a copy of your voter registration card. Additionally, we recommend bringing a government issued photo identification card as well.
- Once you arrive at the poll location a volunteer, poll worker or Assistant Registrar will verify your identity, check you on the voters list and lead you to a voting machine.
- Voting will take place on a Machine.
 - A voting machine is a computer where you will vote on an electronic ballot. The ballot will have all the candidates you can vote for.
 - Voting on a machine is just the same and as easy as voting on a paper ballot.
 - Your vote will be mechanically counted.
 - Don't be afraid. The machine will be set up for you and someone will help you through the process and make sure that you completed all the steps!

- *Contacting your public officials about any issue that might be of concern to you or your community;*

To contact your public officials, you can do so by email, letter, fax, phone, or you can make an appointment to meet in person. Remember, you must always be friendly, respectful, and patient when talking to any of your public officials, even if you don't agree with them on an issue.

- *Join an advocacy group such as TIRRC;*
An advocacy group is a group or organization that works together to promote a cause such as immigrant and refugee rights for example.
